Bishop Kiesey added, "We will miss her joyful and caring approach to ministry and pray for her quick return to full health."

Since 2009, Rev. Dr. Joanne Bartelt has served as the District Superintendent in the Blue Water District. Previously, she served Ann Arbor First UMC, Gladstone Memorial UMC and Rochester St Paul's UMC.

"I am deeply grateful for Duane's willingness to return to lead as the interim DS in the Blue Water District. "Commented Bishop Kiesey, "Duane's leadership has always been an exceptional gift to our conference and I look forward to working with him on the cabinet. " Bishop Kiesey continued, "Please hold him in your prayers as he cares for the people of the Blue Water District."

Rev. Miller retired in 2011. In addition to serving as the Detroit East District Superintendent, he served Memphis: First/Lamb Charge, Seymour Lake UMC, Caro UMC, Macomb Community Church and the Gwinn/Ishpeming/Salisbury Charge. From 1986 to 1996, he served as the Associate Council Director of Stewardship and Evangelism for the Detroit Annual Conference.

Who drives the farthest to attend Paint Creek Sunday worship services? That would be Jan Van Dyke. She drives round trip 73 miles each Sunday from Hartland. What is Jan's story?

Jan was born in Detroit and lived in Redford until she was 1 year old when the family moved to Macomb township. Her dad worked for the Macomb County Health Department dealing with environmental health issues. Eventually he became an administrator of the health department. Her mother was a stay-athome mom until Jan was in high school. Mom worked part-time in the Chippewa

Valley schools in the kitchen, library and finally as a secretary. Jan had 3 siblings (one now deceased) - 2 brothers and a sister with Jan being #2 of these siblings. Jan attended schools in 3 districts graduating from Chippewa High School. Her advanced studies were at Macomb Community College then transferring to Michigan State University where she graduated with a degree in elementary education. Due to a job lay off in 1982, Jan attended Eastern Michigan University training to teach emotionally impaired children. This course work allowed her to return to the classroom the following school year working with elementary children in the Special Education program for 4 years. The remainder of her teaching experience was in regular elementary classes. Jan retired in 2011 after 36 years with the Huron Valley Schools. Her family was all the children she taught during her career in education. Travel has been an adventure for Jan as she has camped across the U.S.A. and Canada. Her favorite locations have been along Lake Michigan and the northwest area of our state. Jan use to hike, bike and horseback ride before caring for her elderly father in recent years. Now Jan enjoys reading and looking for new adventures and experiences.

Pastor Tom was surprised one June Sunday when Jan showed up to visit with Pastor and Lois. Pastor Tom had handled her father's funeral weeks earlier. Much to her surprise she felt at home during this visit. Jan sensed "a feeling of warmth, joy and friendliness" so decided to attend Paint Creek each Sunday. Jan states: "She feels joy all week long after attending church." This is the first time she has felt this way in all her years of attending churches.

What does Jan enjoy about Paint Creek? She enjoys Pastor Tom's sermons, his delivery and that members welcome you with open arms. She now feels her family is the Paint Creek membership. Paint Creek welcomes Jan and is glad to have her as a choir member and new member of our church.

Partridge in a Pear Tree 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning; the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember. Cont. pg. 5

The **partridge** in a pear tree was Jesus Christ. Two **turtle doves** were the Old and New Testaments. Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love. The four calling birds were the four gospels of John The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the testament. The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creations. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit-

Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy. The **eight maids a milking** were the eight beatitudes. **Nine ladies dancing** were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit-Love, Joy, Self-Control. The **ten lords a leaping** were the Ten Commandments. The **eleven pipers piping** stood for the eleven faithful disciples. The **twelve drummers**

drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles Creed.

So, there is your history for today. This was shared with me and I found it interesting and now I know how that strange song became a Christmas Carol.
