## pastor's column



### *From the Pastor's Desk*

“O, come let us sing to the Lord.”

I sang with the Grace Chorale, the Women's Choir at Second Grace United Methodist Church for almost fifteen years. We gathered gratefully and graciously once a week under the tutelage of our talented director to ready our voices for Sunday services. Over the years we sang anthems that became favorites for the congregation. We each had a personal favorite. Mine was and is “This Little Light of Mine.” I love the many arrangements of this hymn. It can be sung as a prayer of promise in anthem form or as a rousing spiritual that calls for clapping hands, swaying

bodies and stomping feet. If, like me, you learned it in church camp or Vacation Bible School, then you can relate.

No matter how it is sung it never fails to bring joy to my heart and soul. Sometimes it brings tears to my eyes as the simple words draw me closer to God. With each line sung I confirm my commitment to be the “light of the world” that Jesus exhorted the disciples to be in His Sermon on the Mount. (Matthew 5-7)

Often, music is my means of worship. On any given day I find myself humming or singing aloud a hymn. The words will come to me in moments of great joy or times of great challenge. I sing “Breath on Me Breath of God” when I feel overwhelmed by having so many things to accomplish and seemingly not enough time to do them in. I whisper “My Faith Looks Up to Thee” when circumstances beyond my control test my faith and I need grounding. At times when I feel far from the creator I close my eyes and lift the words of “Amazing

Grace”. It helps me remember that he promised he would never leave me or forsake me.

Psalm 95 exhorts us to “sing to the Lord” as we worship Him. We are told to “shout joyfully to the rock of our salvation.” Shouting the words to “Thank You, Lord” is certainly a better way to diffuse my anger when a driver cuts me off in evening traffic! What hymn lifts you up in moments of daily distress? If you don't have one, try mine. I guarantee things will start to look much better when you start telling God how and when you're going to let your light shine.

### PERSON OF FAITH

Pastor Carolyn Jones

Pastor Carolyn Jones was born in Atlanta, Georgia. Her parents lived in College Park outside the city. Her father's father passed away when he was a teenager. He stayed on to work the small farm and care for his family. After leaving the farm, he delivered ice to the homes where they had ice boxes. When pastor was 2 1/2 years old, the family moved to Detroit for better job opportunities. Dad worked as a brick layer and then as a self-taught auto mechanic for twenty years. Pastor Carolyn's mother was a stay-at-home mom until her children were older. She then worked as a housekeeper. Prior to her retirement, her mother served as companion and housekeeper to an elderly lady. Pastor Carolyn is the oldest sibling having 2 younger brothers with one now deceased.

Pastor worked at a variety of jobs. She worked in the library at Wayne State University then as a bank teller, sales clerk at Hudson's, a stay-at-home mom, established her own business doing sewing and clothing repair, teaching sewing and other summer teaching programs.

After graduation from college in 1970, she married. Her husband worked for the federal government (Equal Opportunity Employment Commission). They were married 36 years before his passing in 2006. Pastor and her husband raised 2 daughters and a son. Obtaining an education was

stressed in the family, so the children went on to obtain advanced degrees. One daughter has a Master's degree with 2 earning Ph.D. degrees. The oldest daughter teaches music at a Michigan school while the second daughter is a research scientist at Baylor University in Houston, Texas. Her son lives in California where he works as a marketing manager. Pastor Carolyn enjoys visiting with each of her 5 grandchildren.

Pastor's parents also stressed the importance of an education. Pastor Carolyn is a graduate of Cass Technical High School in Detroit where she later taught for 8 years and Wayne State University earning a Bachelor's degree in Spanish and a minor in French. Her Master's degree is in education. Using her training, Pastor worked for the Detroit schools for sixteen years and in Southfield for ten years teaching 7th-12th graders.

As a second career Pastor Carolyn decided to become a minister in 2015. She had felt the calling most of her life. For forty-eight years, she attended Second Grace United Methodist Church in Detroit where she held many positions, often teaching, singing in the choir and a member of the U.M.W. Her minister and friends kept encouraging her to become a minister. For 4 years the message only got stronger. After attending a Lay Servant class, she prayed and talked with God. His question to her was: "What are you afraid of?" She realized God would guide her. Soon she was appointed to be a local pastor at a church in Sterling Heights. This past summer and fall she completed studies allowing her to perform local pastor duties. At this time she has signed up for 2 courses of study. This summer she will attend Garrett Seminary in

Chicago for 1 week. In preparation for her summer studies, she will be doing on-line work, reading and completing written assignments.

Pastor Carolyn has many interests and hobbies. They include: photography, making beaded jewelry, gardening (loves flowers), sewing, reading spiritual books about the Bible, characters of the Bible and about artists. A favorite author is Paulo Coelho. Often she visits the Detroit Institute of Arts to view exhibits. Travel is a special interest as she has been to Spain, many Caribbean islands and areas of the U.S.A.

Her favorite part of the ministry is teaching stories about the Bible. An important part of her life has been prayer.

What has Pastor Carolyn enjoyed about the 2 churches. Having the opportunity to meet and talk one-on-one with the memberships and helping people establish a personal relationship with God. She also wants to remain humble in her role as pastor.

Howarth and Paint Creek churches wish Pastor Carolyn much success in her ministry classes and future years in her second profession.

### DEVOTIONAL GROUP STUDY – Wednesdays 10:00 a.m. at Paint Creek

Come gather with other spiritual family members to share a longer devotional time (about one hour). Did you know that *The Upper Room* was originally developed as a small group study? Share the daily Wednesday devotional together with prayer, scripture, probing questions, and reflection.

### DISCOVERING YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS -Begins

**Sunday, 2/19, 2:00 p.m. -4:30 p.m.** (Participants determine future dates if not 2/26, 3/5, and 3/12 2:00 p.m.-4:30 p.m.) In this class, individuals are encouraged to discover God’s call to ministry and to recognize then embrace their spiritual gifts.

Four ministry categories are identified (receive, relate, equip, and send) through scripture and activities leading to practical ways to use our gifts in ministry, in our congregation, and in our community.

### ACTS – On Sundays after church services (currently 1pm at Paint Creek)

All are welcome to join the established class. We meet on Sunday after morning service. We alternate between Paint Creek and Howarth because members from both congregations are participating. Before he ascended into heaven Jesus commanded the disciples to go into the world to make disciples of all men. Doing so meant that they faced endless struggles and persecution. The church today stands as a testament to their commitment, struggles, and perseverance.

Sitting in my office on a cold wintery day, with a five year old barking in my ear, I wonder what the future has in store for us. Four years ago my wife Kathy was diagnosed with cancer. The next eight months were very hard on Kathy and the whole family as we watched her health fail rapidly. I prayed that she and all affected would be healed by a miracle from heaven and all of the problems would be solved. Sadly it didn't happen then and probably won't in the near future. 6 months after Kathy was diagnosed, I was given a gift from God, a child under two years old to care for along with a sick wife.

As things began to settle down as best as they could, I received a call that my father had taken a turn for the worse. Then Kathy got worse and my dad was failing fast. Also at the same time DHS was calling me. To make a long story short my dad and Kathy passed away, and DHS decided they must do a home visit while we were dealing with the deaths (before the funerals).

We got through all this and things were beginning to calm down. Then the call came that no parent ever wants to hear, we need you to come to the hospital there has been a tragedy. I had to go and identify my daughter, Ashley, and sign papers. We struggled through the shock of a daughter, (sister, niece and cousin) dying from a disease that is killing approximately 129 people a day in this country.

This is a story of how mine and my family's life has been for the past 4 years. Where is he going with this some people are thinking about right now. It brings me to a Bible verse that I always told Ashley when we talked, Psalm 23:4 "Though I walk through the valley of darkness I will fear no evil for the Lord is with me ..." how true this verse is. Psalm 23 is of great importance to me but verse 4 was the one that I felt she needed to hear.

No matter what you are going through the Lord is right there by your side and he will carry you if need be. All too often when life throws us a curve ball we want to handle it by ourselves. Well people I can testify we **can't**. My story is not much different than many people in this world, we don't look for pity, we look for ways to make our lives and those around us more bearable as we move on to another day.

Psalm 23 is a blessing to all people; The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters. He restores my soul; He leads me in the paths of righteousness For His name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; For You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my

enemies; You anoint my head with oil; My cup runs over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; And I will dwell in the house of the LORD Forever. KJV

The Lord is giving us everything we need, comfort, joy, hope, and love. We just have to go to him and ask for it, he gives us the strength to get through the curve balls life throws at us. He gives us the green pastures to lie down on and relax. He has given many streams of water to us to go and relax by (what is more calming than a stream of water a fishing pole and some worms). There is nothing in life we have to face alone if we choose, God has given us all many friends and family to surround us and love us, and most important he gave us himself and his son. Verse 4 "I will fear no evil for you are with me your rod and staff comfort me", how soothing is it to know that when we need a loving hand he is there to provide us one, it may be a neighbor, a friend, a family member or a total stranger. He is there we just have to open our eyes and our hearts to a LOVING GOD.
