And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. Let all bitterness, anger, clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you. Therefore, be imitators of God, as beloved children. So, let us walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, as a living offering and sacrifice to God for our salvation. Ephesians 4:30-5:2

A few weeks ago, I scanned through the book, *The Evangelistic Love of God and Neighbor*. In this book, the author gives detailed ideas on how we can use his evangelistic philosophy to grow spiritually and increase the

number of people to receive Christ as well as bringing them back into Christian fellowship and worship. As a smaller church we feel the need to grow. Many times, smaller churches say we need younger people and we need new families if we are going to survive. Is there a clear-cut evangelistic answer that works to bring people to church?

Many churches seeking and wanting growth will start by copying or imitating the ideas of former struggling churches that have gone from a weekly attendance of 20 or less, to over 300 plus on a given Sunday. What can a church do to get people to come to church? What model of evangelism could we copy to grow larger? Are we at Howarth and Paint Creek ready to model or imitate a growing church in the area by following their example?

As a young person growing up, I was told, "imitation was the highest form of flattery." The idea behind that saying was that we could improve ourselves and gain popularity by finding someone or something worth imitating and using that idea to make ourselves look better and more attractive. Is imitating some thing or many things the answer to get people to come to church?

The reality is that many of us, whether we know or not, already imitate something at some level either consciously or subconsciously. We cannot help it for it is just part of the human condition in which we are molded and shaped by the outside environment that surrounds us from our parents, friends, mentors and even celebrities. Is imitating the success or others the answer when it comes to church growth?

In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, he implores the church in Ephesus to walk the Christian walk. He tells them to put aside all the vices that they once lived out in their lives and to pursue the nature of Christ. As he encouraged them to put off the old self and put on the new, he gave a list of things they should leave behind. Paul said, "Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another; be tenderhearted and forgiving of each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you. Therefore, be imitators of God, as beloved children; and walk in love, just as Christ also loved and gave himself up for us."

So, what does it take to grow a church? Paul suggests that we are to imitate Christ and to go out and invite. We are to leave behind the

Let me encourage all of us at Howarth and Paint Creek to take up our crosses and follow Christ by being imitators of Him. The world has plenty of imitators following the latest popular persons and ideas and all too often there is a line of Christians doing the same. We don't need to imitate other churches, we need only to imitate and model the words in the Holy Bible. From there we need to go to others in need of our Savior and they in turn will come and worship with us.

HISTORIC MARKER FOR PAINT CREEK UMC

The Paint Creek UMC recently received an historic marker from the Oakland Township Historic District Commission.

In the 1970's, Delta Kelly was instrumental in listing our church as an historic district in Oakland Township. We finally were offered the opportunity to create wording for a marker and the historic marker has been installed on the front of the church.

The marker reads:

1855, Paint Creek United
Methodist Church, Inspired by
Rev. John Russell, who became
a leader of the Prohibition
Party, St. John's Methodist
Church was erected in 1855 at
the corner of Buell and
Rochester Rds. In 1887 the
church was dismantled and
moved by horse team to this
current location in Goodison.

So, who was this John Russell guy? Actually, well known in the

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mid-1800's as an itinerant Methodist pastor, John Russell travelled the circuit to reach small communities north of Detroit. It is thought that he did revival meetings on weekends and that some of Oakland Township's residents attended. Therefore, the inspiration to build the first Methodist church in the township. When the Oakland settlement diminished and the Goodison community grew (the train came through) it was decided to move St. John's Methodist Church to Goodison. John Russell went on to become rather famous as first Chairman of the Prohibition Party and the first Vice Presidential candidate for the party in 1872.

This is a year-round position. At the same time, he also serves as technical director for his wife's Peanut Gallery Players (a non-profit year-round theater group for youth.)

Scot and Stacy knew one another at Rochester Adams High School in the theater program but did not date until young adults. They have been married twenty-eight years. Both immensely enjoy their family of 4 boys ranging in age from twenty-three to thirteen years. Their twins are twenty-one years old.

When first married Scot and Stacy traveled to Germany. Lately their journeys have been to New York City to see theater productions on Broadway and visit friends and relatives on the east coast. Scot enjoys cooking, reading history novels and doing yard work. His favorite interest that always comes first is his wife and boys.

The Cleaveland's were long time members at another church when they decided to seek out a new church. Paint Creek was on their list of churches to visit. They knew of the church through scouting programs and various other activities held at Paint Creek. When our church was advertising for a Sunday pianist, Stacy saw the flyer at a music store.
